



CRYSTAL PEAKS - PAUL THE BISCUIT

Paul the Biscuit's Birthday 04/12/52

On Thursday 4 December Paul was born. Also born in December 1952 was the jockey John Francome, cricketer Joel Garner, actress Jenny Agutter and Dire Straits songwriter David Knopfler

On 6 Dec United beat Fulham 2-1 at Bramall Lane on their way to the Division 2 title. Wednesday lost 2-1 at Sunderland and finished 18th in Div 1.

Surrey won the County championship, Newcastle won the FA Cup and Man Utd Div 1. Helsinki had held the Olympics with the Equestrian team winning the only British medal.

In 1952 the most popular films included "The Quiet Man", "High Noon", "Singing in the Rain" and "The Greatest Show on Earth". The first Xmas number 1 was in 1952 – "Here in my Heart" Al Martino.

The Mousetrap opened in London in 1952 and Parliament discussed the Biscuit Manufacturers Levy – they must have known about Paul.

4 December 1965 - Paul becomes a teenager

Among the top films of 1965 were "The Sound of Music", "Doctor Zhivago", "Thunderball" and "Help!" The top records included: "The Carnival Is Over" by The Seekers, "My Generation" by The Who, "1-2-3" by Len Barry and "Let's Hang On!" by The Four Seasons.

4 December 1973 - Paul is 21

Among the top films of 1973 were "Live and Let Die", "A Touch of Class", "The Day of The Jackal" and "Ivanhoe!" The top records included: "Paper Roses" by Marie Osmond, "You Won't Find Another Fool Like Me" by the New Seekers, "Roll Away the Stone" by Mott the Hoople, "Merry Xmas Everybody" by Slade and "I Wish It Could Be Christmas Everyday" by Wizzard

4 December 2002 - Paul is 50

Among the top films of 2002 were "Harry Potter and the Chamber of Secrets", "Die Another Day" and "The Lord of the Rings: The Two Towers" The top records included: "Cheeky Song (Touch My Bum)" by The Cheeky Girls and "Sorry Seems to be the Hardest Word" by Blue featuring Elton John
